The proposal includes the construction and upgrading of approximately 4.2 kilometres of stopbanks, associated earthworks, road raising, drainage and stormwater infrastructure, works within and adjacent to the Waipaoa River, temporary water take and discharge activities during construction, vegetation clearance, temporary access works, service relocations, and landscape planting and site reinstatement.

Mahaki Tiaki Tangata (MTT) supports the proposed Te Karaka Stopbank Upgrade and recognises it as an important investment in improving the resilience and safety of the Te Karaka community.

MTT was established in response to Cyclone Gabrielle, following the devastating impacts experienced by Te Aitanga-a-Māhaki whānau in our communities. The cyclone demonstrated the vulnerability of our people, infrastructure and emergency management systems during a significant weather event. It also highlighted the strength, leadership and capability that exists within our own communities when local people are empowered to respond.

The proposed stopbank upgrade represents one important component of building a more resilient future for Te Karaka.

Mahaki Tiaki Tangata supports the proposal because it contributes to reducing the flood risk faced by our community and strengthens the resilience of Te Karaka for future generations.

The experiences of Cyclone Gabrielle fundamentally changed our understanding of emergency management. While engineered infrastructure plays a critical role in protecting

communities, our experience has shown that physical infrastructure alone cannot eliminate risk.

True resilience is achieved through the combination of:

- Resilient infrastructure;
- Prepared communities;
- Effective emergency management partnerships; and
- Ongoing investment in community capability.

For this reason, Mahaki Tiaki Tangata strongly supports continued investment in flood mitigation infrastructure while recognising that emergency preparedness and community response capability must continue alongside these physical improvements.

As an iwi-led emergency response organisation, Mahaki Tiaki Tangata has continued to develop local response capability, strengthen relationships across our communities, and maintain collaborative relationships with Tairāwhiti Civil Defence Emergency Management and Gisborne District Council. While our operating model is iwi-led, we recognise that effective emergency management relies on partnership between iwi, local government and emergency services.

We acknowledge the collaborative approach that has been undertaken during the development of this proposal and encourage that partnership to continue throughout construction, future maintenance, emergency planning and ongoing flood resilience initiatives.

Mahaki Tiaki Tangata requests that the Gisborne District Council:

- Grant the resource consent for the Te Karaka Stopbank Upgrade.
- Encourage continued partnership between Gisborne District Council, Tairāwhiti Civil Defence Emergency Management, Te Aitanga-a-Māhaki and Mahaki Tiaki Tangata throughout implementation and future emergency planning.
- Recognise that long-term community resilience is strengthened through both flood protection infrastructure and sustained investment in iwi and community emergency capability.
